They have been passing the Winter in Los Angeles and will stop en route to their home in Wisconsin.

REV. H. H. GRIFFIS TO TALK.—Rev. Harold H. Griffis, pastor of the First Christian Church and one of the popular young ministers of the city, will address the noon assembly in the Unitarian Church on Friday. The meetings are interdenominational and are being well attended. Among the churches that have assisted in the meetings are the Trinity Episcopal, Jewish Temple Beth, First Presbyterian, First Congregational, Unitarian and Baptist.

VINDICATION AND MONEY ARE SOUGHT.—Vindication and \$10,000 in cash are sought by Minnie C. Young in her suit against J. F. Hawks on trial yesterday before a jury in Circuit Judge Phelps' court. The plaintiff claims that the defendant caused her arrest in October, 1916, on a charge of cattle stealing. She avers that later he dismissed the charge but not until it had caused her considerable worry and humiliation. Because of the alleged false arrest she now seeks recompense.

PRISONERS WILL BREAK ROCK.—County prisoners will be put to work at the rock quarry near the Sky Line boulevard tomorrow morning. The Commissioners yesterday contracted with an automobile firm to transport the prisoners to and from the jail for \$10 a day. Those who are put to work will be provided with heavy shoes and suitable clothing and will be given a small daily wage as an incentive for good work.

GOLD WATCH GIVEN MAYOR.—As a token of esteem for Mayor Albee who retires July 1 the members of the Bureau of Police yesterday presented him with a gold watch. The token was handed him yesterday morning by Chief Clark and Captains Moore and Baty. A subscription was taken at the police station and each member of the force contributed. The watch has inscribed on the case "To Mayor Albee, from the Portland Police Bureau."

REV. E. L. HOUSE TO LECTURE.—Rev. E. L. House will lecture today at Rose City Park Church, East Forty-fifth and Hancock streets, on the general subject, "The Psychology of the Gospel." At 3 P. M. the subject will be "The Power of Affirmation" and at 8 P. M., "The Forces of Suggestion." Dr. House is holding a series of meetings and will lecture every afternoon and evening this week and next. The lectures are free.
